Second Annual Virtual Conference

June 28-30 2021, 3-5pm BST/10am-12pm EDT

We are delighted to announce the upcoming #TeachECONference2021! The first edition of this conference in June 2020 drew more than 300 attendees from around the world to hear presentations and participate in discussions about all things related to teaching economics. Recordings and transcripts are available on <u>our web site</u>. This year, #TeachECONference2021 will be even bigger and better. The conference will run on Zoom over three days.

The conference will open on the 28th June with a plenary discussion, focused on the challenges and opportunities of teaching economics in 2020/21. Panel members confirmed so far include Derek Bruff (Vanderbilt University), Joshua Eyler (University of Mississippi) and Jennifer Imazeki (San Diego State University). The heart of the conference will be several sessions of participant presentations, and we will close the conference with a second panel discussion on 30th June on Best Practices and New Ideas for Teaching Econometrics led by Joshua Angrist (MIT), Tanya Byker (Middlebury College), Amanda Gregg (Middlebury College), George Orlov (Cornell University), Jörn-Steffen Pischke (LSE) and Theodore Svoronos (Harvard Kennedy School).

We invite you to submit a proposal to present at the conference. We are looking for people to submit ideas for 10-minute presentations on any topic that they think will be of interest to people involved with economics education at the university level. This can include topics that relate to what happens in the classroom and/or online, your perspectives on assessment, how you approach student support and a whole lot more. The presentation can be a reflection on your own experience, research in progress or a paper that is almost ready for publication. We are interested in topics that engage the audience and provide insights on what it is like to teach in our ever-evolving world.
